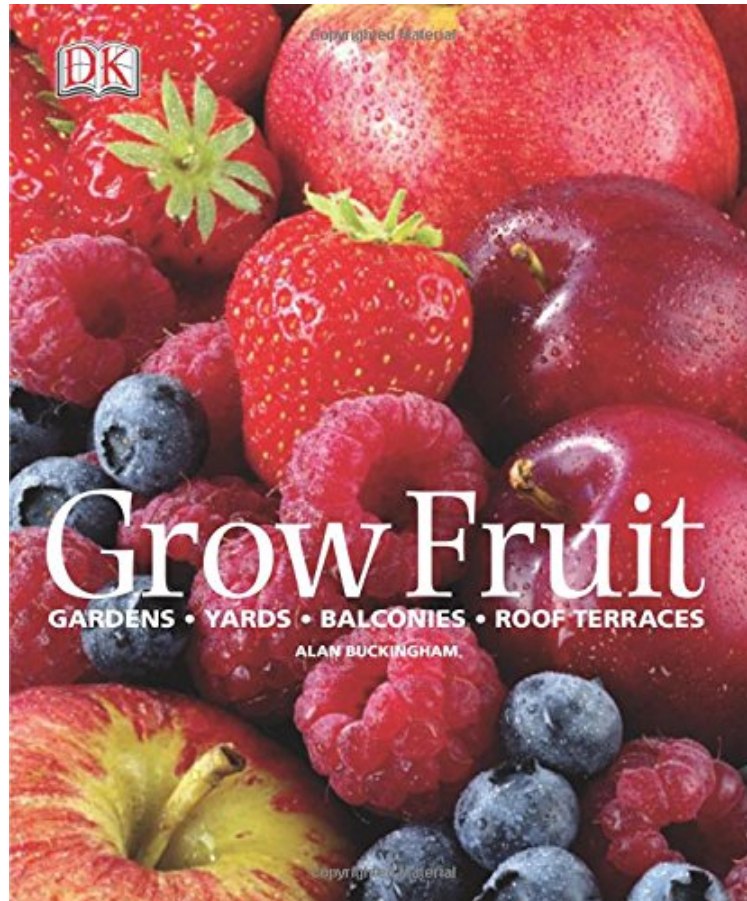

"Grow Fruit" is the best book on the subject right now. It's comprehensive in breadth with adequate depth, and very well illustrated. Even off beat fruits like mulberries, quinces, etc. are covered. The information is accurate for the most part. Also, the downside risks are covered pretty well for each fruit, unlike the usual gushing optimism in other fruit books- you'll know the battles that lie ahead before you start. The one area where the book falls short is in variety information, which is crucial to success. You'll have to comb forums on the internet for that. Several examples are: mulberries where many varieties are placed on equal footing, but "Illinois Everbearing" and "Pakistan" are the gold standards; grapes where trouble prone vinifera's like "Flame" are given full coverage while only outdated labrusca's like "Concord" and "Canadice" are mentioned, instead of winners like "Jupiter", "Steuben", and "Glenora". (The Grape Grower: A Guide to Organic Viticulture by Lon Rombough is a must have to succeed with grapes.) Beginning to intermediate fruit growers should have this book in
