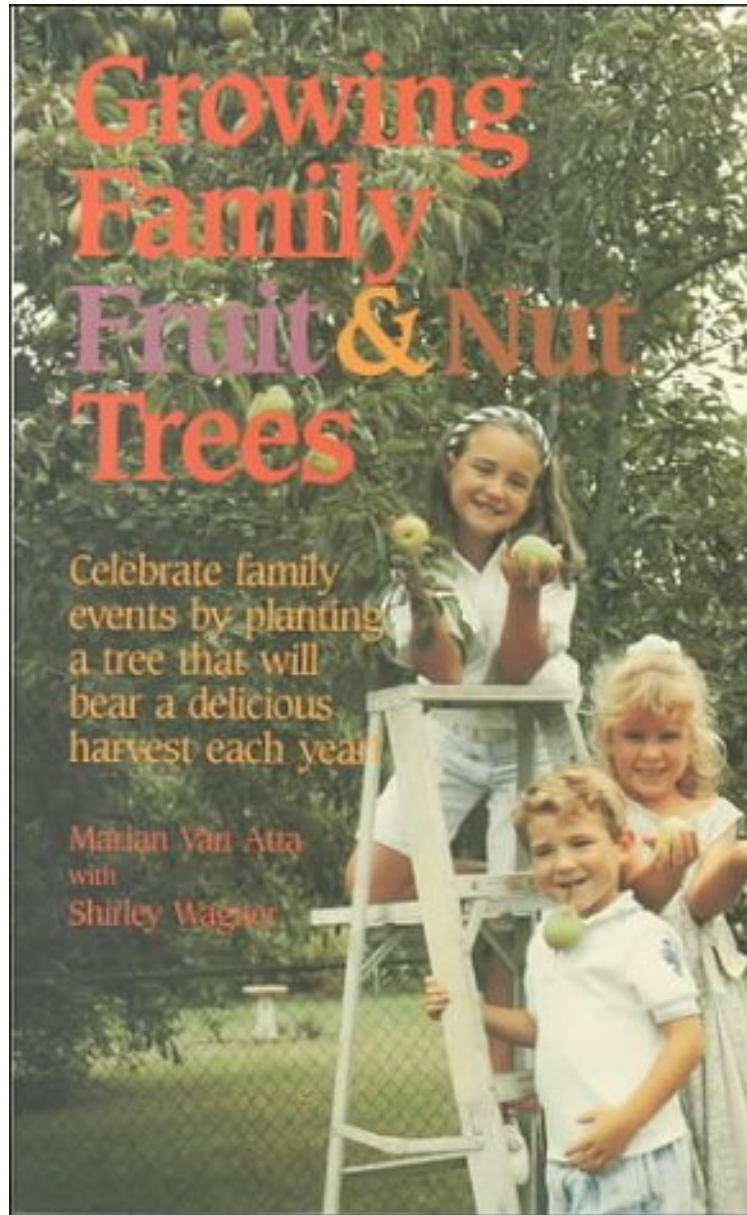

But I have been researching fruit trees and berries hoping someday to establish an organic farm. Van Atta's book is not worth the time it takes to even skim through it. This book is completely useless. It's bad enough when people that don't have a science background try to write how-to books for gardening because they don't know or don't care to give consistent information about plant spacing and crop yields so even when these books don't contradict themselves they can still give the reader, and would-be new gardener or farmer only the vaguest of ideas about what they need to plant for their efforts to be worthwhile. I realize that soil conditions and climate and any number of other factors will determine how you should plant and what kind of yields you can expect. But even vague information about such things is better than no information at all when it comes to planning purposes. But Van Atta's book doesn't even make this attempt. I can find nothing in the book about plant spacing and nothing about expected yields. Florida is the 5th place the author has lived (I am a native and lifelong resident), but she spends an entire chapter on citrus when most readers likely cannot grow citrus in their respective climates. This book is simply an excuse to collect royalties.
